What is the Sports Premium?

The Government is providing funding of £150 million per annum to provide new, substantial primary school sport funding'. This funding is being jointly provided by the Departments for Education, Health and Culture, Media and Sport, and will see money going directly to primary school head teachers to spend on improving the quality of sport and PE for all their children. Here at William Stockton we received around £9,660 in 2014/15, in 2015-2016 we received £9,205.00 and the amount for 2016-2017 is yet to be confirmed.

The sport funding can only be spent on sport and PE provision in schools.

Department for Education's Purpose of funding:

Schools will have to spend the sport funding on improving their provision of PE and sport, but they will have the freedom to choose how they do this.

Possible uses for the funding include:

- hiring specialist PE teachers or qualified sports coaches to work alongside primary teachers when teaching PE
- new or additional sport clubs
- paying for professional development opportunities in PE/sport
- providing cover to release primary teachers for professional development in PE/sport
- running sport competitions, or increasing participation in the school games
- buying quality assured professional development modules or materials for PE/sport
- providing places for pupils on after school sport clubs and holiday clubs.
- Membership to the Cheshire Oaks Sports School Partnerships – giving us access to range of CPD, enabling children to participate in a range of sporting competitions and events

How William Stockton Primary will be spending the Sports Funding 2016-2017 and who will benefit:

The Governors agree that the money must be used so that: *all children benefit* regardless of sporting ability; that the most able children are given the opportunity to compete in advanced tournaments; that staff have access to training opportunities and continued professional development; swimming is subsidised in order to support all families financially.

The table below shows how we intend to spend the sports funding during 2016-17.

Swimming Subsidy For Key Stage 2 Children
<p>Swimming is part of the National Curriculum, before children leave our school it is expected that they are able to meet the objectives highlighted below. At William Stockton Primary School, all children go swimming in KS2 and continue through the Juniors with extra sessions in the Summer Term for Y3 and Y4 – these ‘extra’ sessions in allow those who haven’t managed to swim 25 m by Y4 to do so before they leave us and those who are able to swim to prepare for the local Swimming Competition we enter in the Summer term each year. These extra-sessions are subsidised by the sports funding the school receive.</p> <p>“Swimming: activities and water safety: Breadth of study. DFE, PE National Curriculum.</p> <p>9. Pupils should be taught to: a. pace themselves in floating and swimming challenges related to speed, distance and personal survival b. swim unaided for a sustained period of time over a distance of at least 25m c. use recognised arm and leg actions, lying on their front and back d. use a range of recognised strokes and personal survival skills [for example, front crawl, back crawl, breaststroke, sculling, floating and surface diving].”</p>
Hiring qualified sports coaches to work alongside teachers when teaching PE
<p>The school has hired the services of Graham MacTaggart, to deliver PE lessons alongside our staff in particular Tennis. This initiative will benefit all children from the Year 1 – Year 6. Not only will the children benefit from being taught by an external member of staff, but our own staff will be developed through sharing good practice and assisting in the PE lessons.</p> <p>We have employed PE specialists Joey Fontana to work in and deliver lessons alongside teachers and deliver quality lessons. The teachers observe the best practice of the specialist and improve their own practice for further lessons.</p>

Providing places for pupils for after school sport club

William Stockton also offers a range of after school clubs, accessed by children from Key Stages one and two. These clubs will continue to run without any of the charges that we pay coaches who deliver these clubs being passed onto the parents. Currently the clubs on offer are:

Breakfast Clubs: Multi-Skills, Gifted and Talented Tennis, Football

Lunch Clubs: Active Kids

Afterschool Clubs: Tennis, Multi-Skills, Dance

Increasing participation in school sport

As well as using our teachers we will utilise Graham McTaggart who will be used to prepare children for tournaments, offering specialist training to support our pupils in many areas such as Netball, athletics, Basketball. We canvass pupils to find out what they would like to see on offer then try to put it on here in school or signpost the parents to local events that match their needs and interests. Outdoor and Adventurous activities are part-funded by the school to enable children to enjoy canoeing, High ropes, raft building, mountain biking, archery and zip lines for example; when they are on residential trips from Year 1.

We have become members of the Cheshire Oaks School Sports Partnership this give staff access to a variety of CPD opportunities to develop their practice. It also enables children to opportunity to participate in a variety of inter school competitions and to experience a range of new sports.

Hiring a specialist PE teacher

We pay for the services of a PE specialist . The PE teacher delivers some PE lessons alongside our staff including: invasion games, gymnastic, dance and striking & fielding games. . Again, not only will the children benefit from being taught by a PE teacher, but our own staff will be developed through sharing good practice and assisting in the PE lessons.

Providing opportunities for children to compete

Again, in partnership with our Schools cluster, the Sports Funding will pay for the services of a school sports coordinator. Their role will be to arrange tournaments and fixtures between the cluster primaries, whilst offering exit routes for our more gifted children, allowing them to compete against other children at a higher level. We have had some fantastic pupils representing us in the past and we feel it is important that children who are more able in sport continue to be given the chance to participate against others of a similar ability and potential.
