Pupil Premium Policy

Aims:

At William Stockton School we have high aspirations and ambitions for our children and we believe no child should be left behind. We strongly believe that it is not where you come from but your passion and thirst for knowledge, and your dedication and commitment to learning that make the difference between success and failure, and we are determined to ensure that our children are given every chance to realise their full potential. Pupil premium funding represents a significant proportion of our budget and this policy outlines how we will ensure it is spent to maximum effect.

Background:

The pupil premium is a government initiative that targets extra money at pupils from deprived backgrounds. Research shows that pupils from deprived backgrounds underachieve compared to their non-deprived peers. The premium is provided to enable these pupils to be supported to reach their potential.

The Government has used pupils entitled to free school meals (FSM), looked after children and service children as indicators of deprivation, and have provided a fixed amount of money for schools per pupil based on the number of pupils registered for FSM over a rolling six year period. This fixed amount of money is expected to increase every year for the course of this current Parliament. At William Stockton we will be using the indicator of those eligible for FSM as well as identified vulnerable groups as our target children to 'diminish the gap' regarding attainment.

Context:

When making decisions about using pupil premium funding it is important to consider the context of the school and the subsequent challenges faced. Common barriers for FSM children can be less support at home, weak language and communication skills, lack of confidence, more frequent behaviour difficulties, and attendance and punctuality issues. There may also be complex family situations that prevent children from flourishing. The challenges are varied and there is no "one size fits all".

Key Principles:

By following the key principles below, we believe we can maximise the impact of our pupil premium spending.

Building Belief

We will provide a culture where:

- Staff believe in ALL children
- There are “no excuses” made for underperformance
- Staff adopt a “solution focused” approach to overcoming barriers
- Staff support children to develop “growth” mind sets towards learning

Analysing Data

We will ensure that:

- All staff are involved in the analysis of data so that they are fully aware of strengths and weaknesses across the school
- We use research (such as the Education Endowment Foundation Toolkit) to support us in determining the strategies that will be most effective. Our Pupil Premium Strategies can be found on the school websites indicating how we spend our money.

Identification of Pupils

We will ensure that:

- ALL teaching staff and support staff are involved in the analysis of data and identification of pupils
- ALL staff are aware of who pupil premium and vulnerable children are
- ALL pupil premium children benefit from the funding, not just those who are underperforming
- Underachievement at all levels is targeted (not just lower attaining pupils)
- Children’s individual needs are considered carefully so that we provide support for those children who could be doing “even better if...”

Improving Day to Day Teaching

We will continue to ensure that all children across the school receive good teaching, with increasing percentages of outstanding teaching achieved by using our team leaders to:

- Set high expectations

- Ensure quality first teaching
- Precision Teaching
- Address any within-school variance
- Ensure consistent implementation of the non-negotiables, e.g. structured conversations (feedback) and guided reading
- Share good practice within the school and draw on external expertise
- CPD (Continuing Professional Development)
- Improve assessment through joint moderation

Increasing learning time

We will maximise the time the children have to “catch up” through:

- Improving attendance and punctuality
- Providing earlier intervention (KS1 and EYFS)
- Extended learning out of school hours

Individualising support

“There’s no stigma attached to being in an intervention in this school. Everyone needs something, whatever that might be, and so they’re all getting somewhere”

We will ensure that the additional support we provide is effective by:

- Looking at the individual needs of each child and identifying their barriers to learning
- Ensuring additional support staff and class teachers communicate regularly
- Using team leaders to provide quality interventions across their phases
- Use of precision teaching by ALL teachers
- Matching the skills of the support staff to the interventions provided
- Tailoring interventions to the needs of the child (e.g. Targeted maths revision sessions in the afternoons)

- Learning Mentor available for those pupils and families who would benefit from it
- Providing extensive support for parents through “Team around the family” meetings.

Going the Extra Mile

In our determination to ensure that ALL children succeed we recognise the need for and are committed to providing completely individualised interventions for set periods of time to support children in times of crisis.

Monitoring and Evaluation

We will ensure that:

- A wide range of data is used – achievement data, precision teaching, pupils’ work, observations, learning walks, case studies, and staff, parent and pupil voice.
- Assessment Data is collected half termly so that the impact of teaching and interventions. PRECISION TEACHING IDENTIFIES THIS ON A DAILY AND WEEKLY BASIS.
- Assessments are closely moderated to ensure they are accurate
- Teaching staff and support staff attend and contribute to pupil progress meetings each term and the identification of children is reviewed
- Regular feedback about performance is given to children and parents
- Interventions are adapted or changed if they are not working – every 6 weeks
- Case studies are used to evaluate the impact of pastoral interventions, such as on attendance and behaviour
- An overview of pupil premium spending is maintained by the Senior Leadership Team and the Local Governing Board. This is shared at every Local Governing Board meeting.
- Leaders of the school report to Governors on spend and are challenged on the performance of pupils entitled to the pupil premium money.

- Mrs J.Clark is the named person responsible and Mrs D. Hein is the named Pupil Premium Governor.

Reporting

When reporting about pupil premium funding we will include:

- Information about the context of the school
- Objectives for the year
 - Reasons for decision making
 - Analysis of data
 - Use of research (Education Endowment Fund)
- Nature of support and allocation
 - Learning in the curriculum
 - Social, emotional and behavioural issues
 - Enrichment beyond the curriculum
 - Families and community
- An overview of spending
 - Total PPG (pupil premium grant) received
 - Total PPG spent and how
 - Total PPG remaining
- A summary of the impact of PPG
 - Performance of disadvantaged pupils (compared to non-pupil premium children)
 - Other evidence of impact e.g Ofsted, Accreditations
 - Case studies (pastoral support, individualised interventions)
 - Review of current years spend
 - Implications for pupil premium spending in the following year

The Local Governing Board will consider the information provided and will ensure that there is an annual statement to the parents on the school website outlining how the Pupil Premium funding has been used to address the issue of diminishing the difference for pupils eligible for Pupil Premium. This task will be carried out in line with the requirements published by the Department for Education.
